Pittsburgh-based artist Linda Barnicott has added B.F. Jones Memorial Library to the list of buildings she has immortalized in her art. At this year's After Hours event, the Friends of BFJ were delighted to unveil the Library's "official portrait," which is entitled "Then, Now, Forever." The painting blends nostalgia with the familiarity of the present, with vibrant colors and exquisite details.

On October 25, the Library hosted a reception, where Barnicott signed items available for purchase: prints of the painting, bookmarks, Christmas ornaments, and magnets. Attendees were able to meet the artist, to learn about her inspirations for her paintings, and to chat about treasured Pittsburgh and Christmas memories, as Barnicott is billed as "the painter of memories."

"Then, Now, Forever" also features a loving tribute to the long-time President of the Library's Board of Directors, Mrs. Angela M. Stevens, who passed away in July 2023. The green Buick in front of the Library is a replica of the one in which she rode as a young woman, and so there our Ange appears, the silhouette in the passenger's seat, ever-present at the Library she served with such love and dedication.


