All Together Now: Summer 2023

Summer Reading 2023 kicked off on June 3, 2023! Featuring challenges for three age ranges—children, teens, and adults—there's fun for the whole family. With visits from the Little Free Food Truck (time and food donated by the Lutheran House of Prayer in Aliquippa) and The Pirate Parrot, the afternoon featured arts and crafts and lawn games in the Library's courtyard, and the beginning of Free Comic Book Week.

From June 12-14, the Library hosted the Citizen Science Lab, which allows children to get some hands-on experience performing science experiments and learning the importance of STEM education with themes such as Plants. Circuitry, and Robots.

BFJ also welcomed Ms. Brittany and her Summer Yoga class, Professor Steve Haberman and his Magic Show, GSK's Science in the Summer program, and the beginning of two new social groups: Senior Group and Caregivers Support Group. Senior Group takes place on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of the month, while Caregivers Support Group takes place on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays, all at 10:00am.

In late June, we began the latest cycle of the Youth-Led Humanities program. Formerly known as Teen Reading Lounge, YHL aims to teach teens and tweens the importance of representation and diverse perspectives, as well as community service, through a focused literary theme. This year's theme was Food as Culture and Identity.

July sent the Library back to the '40s and '50s with a visit from local performer Vintage Debbie, who lent her talents to a summer tour through multiple Beaver County Library System locations. Her appearance at BFJ featured hits of the Big Band and Swing era, complete with props and audience participation.

That's right! Thanks to the original grant from the Pittsburgh Foundation, and supplemental grants from the Sisters of St. Joseph (Community Garden Grant), the Greater Pittsburgh Food Bank (Summer Impact Grant), and Remake Learning (Remake Learning Grant), the Library has spent the summer tending its new green spaces and cultivating delicious produce!

The hydroponic "Lettuce Grow" tower in the Children's Department, and the raised beds with selfwatering reservoirs and tower gardens in the Library's Courtyard, were assembled and planted by program specialist Peter Quinn.

The Courtyard garden contains flowers, vegetables, and herbs, and the hydroponic tower in the Children's Department holds vegetables and herbs.

Programming involving the gardens has included patrons of all ages, from the toddlers who attend Storytime to the teens who make up the Youth-Led Humanities Group

(previously known as Teen Reading Lounge) to adults, both volunteers and Library Staff.

The Library has also been excited to host programs in conjunction with Penn State Extension's Master Gardeners.

The gardens -- both indoor and outdoor — are harvested every couple of days. Gifts of their bounty are available at the Main Circulation Desk inside the Library, so please stop by and see what our gardens have yielded! Maybe the latest batch includes your favorite.

We would be honored to share the blessings of our gardens with you—the Library has already been able to nourish the spirits and minds of our community for nearly one-hundred years. We're so excited to be able to help nourish their appetites, now, too.

Thank you to our generous donors, to our programming specialist Peter Quinn, to our volunteers, and to our staff, all of whom have played a part in the creation of the gardens.

History Comes Home: Introducing BFJ's new local history cabinets

Jones Memorial Library has long been ewed as the heart of the town; its cennnial presence has allowed it to stand tch as history has marched on here in

They have begun to be filled with ephemera of all kinds. One cabinet houses J&L Steel items, one hosts items el used in the groundbreaking for the Lifrom Aliquippa businesses of yore, one represents the many professional sports figures who call Aliquippa home, including Mike Ditka and Ty Law. We didn't forget the entertainers, either, like Academy Award-winner Joe Letteri (including a miniature Oscar!), and local music legends Jimmie Ross & The Jaggerz.

Another cabinet pays homage to local war heroes with the display of the Purple Heart awarded to Corporal Steven J Durish, USMC (Vietnam), and the medals of PFC James D. Gibson, USMC, who was wounded at Mt. Suribachi on Iwo Jima (WWII). We are so honored to have been entrusted with these invaluable pieces of history, and are ever grateful to those who have served our country with distinction and bravery.

Also on display are the ceremonial shovbrary in 1927, and the inkwell that once sat on the desk of B.F. Jones himself.
