Aliquippa's Own Music Man: Henry Mancini

BFJ pays tribute to the West Aliquippa-raised Mancini, widely regarded as one of the best film composers of all time, with a new gallery-wall-style display.

As Bruce Springsteen once sang, "from small things, big things one day come," and that sentiment could very well be applied to Aliquippa. It may not be big, but it is lucky enough to have been the home of some truly outstanding people.

Chief among them is Oscar-winning musician, arranger, conductor, and composer Enrico Nicola "Henry" Mancini. Although he was born in Ohio, Mancini was raised in West Aliquippa by his parents Quintilliano and Anna. He graduated from Aliquippa High School in 1942, and went on to study at both the Carnegie Institute of Technology (now Carnegie Mellon University), and the Juilliard School of Music.

Following a tour of duty with the U.S. Army Air Forces in the European Theatre during World War II (he was a part of the liberation of the Mauthausen-Gutsen concentration camp) Mancini arrived back in the States, and began his illustrious musical career. Over the decades, he would win twenty Grammy Awards, four Academy Awards, a Golden Globe Award, and be nominated for Emmys twice. (Dare you not to start humming "The Pink Panther Theme" or "Moon River!")

The Library is thrilled to have received a number of Mancini-related pieces of personal memorabilia from Lincoln Park Performing Arts Center; they are now being displayed near the Children's Department.

In February 1929, the B.F. Jones Memorial Library opened its doors for the first time. Last month, we marked our milestone 95th year of operation with a day-long celebration that paid homage both to the Library's present and also to its beginning in the 1920s. From a photobooth with '20sthemed props, to a special Birthday Storytime, to 1920s music with Vintage Debbie, there was entertainment for all ages throughout the course of the day.

One of the day's many highlights was the 95th Birthday Scavenger Hunt; participants were able to pick up a packet from the party table that had photographs of various architectural features in the Library. Then, they had to wander through the building to locate all of them. Visitors of all ages had a

blast looking for everything! (Some were pretty tricky, too!)

The staff, naturally, also got in on the thematic fun with costumes and Jazz Age-inspired outfits, as well as by kicking up their heels for a Charleston tutorial. (Miss Kris even became a speakeasy moll for the day, slinging Prohi-

bition mocktails in the Reference Room! "Ginless" Rickeys and Sober Sidecars were the drinks of the day.)

Perhaps most importantly, though, the day's festivities served as the kickoff for "95 Good Deeds to Celebrate 95 Years," which aims to include the whole Library community in performing good deeds and acts of service in the name of the Library's long history as an integral part of the Aliquippa community.

The Traveling Tales program aims to bring the magic of reading, and awareness of the Library's offerings, to daycares and preschool programs in the Aliquippa area.

In addition to weekly storytimes, the Traveling Tales program also operates "deposit collections" with each of the locations; Honess delivers a bag of books, checked out from the Library's collection, to the daycare or preschool for their inhouse use. The deposit collections are rotated regular-




Try your luck with some Readers' Advisory!

If you're looking to expand your knowledge of Irish literary figures, or the long, fraught road of the Irish people and their history, we've got you covered! Hopefully, there's a little bit of something for everyone here, but if you're in need of some more recommendations, please reach out and let us know!

NON-FICTION: The murder at the heart of Say Nothing: A True Story of Murder and Memory in Northern Ireland by Patrick Radden Keefe is the 1972 abduction and murder of Jean McConville, who was only one of many "disappeared" by the Irish Republican Army during The Troubles. Keefe accessibly weaves together the details of McConville's murder with the lives of prominent figures like Dolours Price, Brendan Hughes, and Gerry Manville with dexterity, but never sugarcoats the terror that engulfed Ireland for nearly forty years in the name of pursuit of social justice.

Although it's non-fiction (Radden Keefe began researching in 2013 after reading the obituary of Dolours Price), this harrowing book reads like the best of novels, rife with vibrant "characters," heartbreaking tragedy, and the kind of tension that sticks with you long after you've turned the last page.
